

The legalization of cannabis has given rise to many questions among housing providers both those who have smoke-free policies and those who do not.

In Alberta, it will be legal to smoke cannabis inside individual units within all forms for multi-unit housing. The only places cannabis smoking will not be permitted is anywhere that tobacco smoking is currently prohibited under law, including indoor common spaces (such as lobbies, elevators, hallways and parkades) and within 5 meters of any public doorway, window or air intake.

That said, landlords, property managers and condo boards will have the authority to include cannabis smoking in their own smoke-free policies. If you already have a smoke-free policy, it is likely already inclusive of cannabis, but you will want to check the wording to be sure.


did you know?
